CLAS Internship Program

- Public humanities internships for Summer A (May 11-June 24, 2020)
- Dr. Charlie Lane: Office of the Senior Vice President/Chief Operating
 Officer
- Howard Bishop Middle:
 - organizational and management tools for volunteering
 - Goal: to assess and improve current volunteering practices to more effectively link volunteers to specific needs

Teacher Survey

- 16 responses
- Questions: previous roles for volunteers, scheduling, recruiting, skills/personality traits of volunteers, training, and improvements/suggestions
- Survey Implications:
 - o a simple system to recruit and schedule volunteers
 - volunteers who are consistent, reliable, and prepared
 - training and onboarding for volunteers with clear expectations to work
 with students, content knowledge and logistical information


Current Volunteering System

Benefits	Drawbacks
UF volunteers can choose times based on their schedules	"so many different places to get volunteers, it would be nice to only go through one place"
College students allow flexibility	Only 1-hour availabilities, could use 2-4 hours
Individual schedules	Parents/college students avoid morning hours
	Inconsistency
	No choice; simply assigned volunteers

Volunteer Survey

- 64 responses
- Questions: previous experiences, recruiting, scheduling, training, and improvements
- Training Materials
 - how to engage a classroom
 - encouraging students
 - ice breaker activities
 - logistical information (check in/out, classroom location)
 - o interacting with unmotivated or defiant students
 - teacher expectations

Rating of overall volunteering experience



- "My overall experience volunteering at Bishop Middle was positive"
 - 1 completely agree
 - 6 completely disagree
 - Volunteer 2020-21
 - 60% yes
 - o 33% unsure

Website Changes

Steps for Volunteers:

- 1. Apply through Alachua County:
 - a. https://apps.raptortech.com/Apply/MTU3OmVuLVVT
- 2. Investigate volunteering programs and opportunities
- 3. Fill out Bishop Middle's Volunteering Form
- 4. Complete training/onboarding process
- 5. Volunteer Feedback

Implementation Example: ExploraVision

- 1. **Recruiting**: information posted on Howard Bishop's website
 - a. Teachers submit information monthly to team leader for volunteering opportunities
- 2. **Register**: sign up through the school board
- 3. Apply: fill out volunteering form on Howard Bishop's website
- 4. **Matching**: Volunteer Coordinator will match volunteers with opportunities


ExploraVision


